Dear

Thank you for your request for official information received 19 January 2021 by Nelson Marlborough Health (NMH)¹, followed by the necessary extension of time 17 February 2021 and notice of decision 17 March 2021, where you seek the following information:

1. The pathway to access specialised eating disorder care within the DHB.

<u>NMH response</u>: The Nelson Marlborough *HealthPathways* website offers clinicians a locallyagreed evidence-informed Eating Disorder Pathway for people to access eating disorder care.

2. Broken down by age and sex, the current number of people awaiting treatment for eating disorders via that pathway i.e. through the DHB mental health team, or specialist facility.

<u>NMH response</u>: The Patient Management System does not capture data for eating disorders, and it would take a significant amount of time and resources to go through individual patient files. As such, NMH declines to respond for this aspect of your request under section 18(f) *'the information requested cannot be made available without substantial collation and research'*.

3. The number of people admitted to hospital (including paediatric hospitals or wards) with an eating disorder or a suspected eating disorder, broken down by name of facility, age and sex, between January 1, 2010 and December 31 2020.

<u>NMH response</u>: Please see Tables One to Three noting eating disorders are identified with one primary Eating Disorder Diagnosis, and there may also be a secondary diagnosis.
