(a) Applied for in high Maori population areas

<u>NMH response</u>: The level of detail to show alcohol licencing applications in designated 'high Maori population areas' is not electronically captured. It would take a significant amount of time and resources to manually extract this information and, as such, NMH refuses this aspect of your request under section 18(f) as 'the information requested cannot be made available without substantial collation and research'.

(b) Investigated by health regulatory officers in consultation with Maori under public health's obligation to te Tiritio Waitangi?

<u>NMH Response</u>: We consulted with iwi Maori over the past year to work together to support oppositions for three off-licence premises that were identified in areas with a high deprivation score.

a) Each PHU's 'Duty to Collaborate' s295 (b) collaborative plan of intervention and prevention strategies developed with the tri-agencies and other partners to prevent alcohol-related harm.

<u>NMH Response</u>: The desired outcome of the Tri-Agency Alcohol Licensing Enforcement Group (ALEG) is to reduce alcohol related harm by:

- Working together at a local level, and committed to shared approaches
- Improving decision making through sharing of information
- Developing and using best practice methods
- Ensuring that key public messages in relation to alcohol are consistent, complementary and supportive.

Both the Marlborough Alcohol Governance Group and the Nelson Tasman Alcohol Harm Prevention Partnership work with partner agencies including Te Piki Oranga, Accident Compensation Corporation (ACC), Local Territorial Authorities, New Zealand Drug Foundation, Community Action on Youth and Drugs (CAYAD), Hospitality New Zealand, New Zealand Transport Authority (NZTA), and New Zealand Police with the key focus to reduce alcohol related harm.

The Tri-Agency group is made up of the three alcohol regulatory reporting agencies as a means to meet their legislative requirements under section 295(a) of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012. Matters for discussion include monitoring of licence premises (Controlled Purchase Operations (CPOs)), and reaching agreement of how and who will address any enforcement issues under the Act.

Sharing Information

Each of the agencies has access to and collects information in relation to alcohol licensing and alcohol related harm. All agencies undertake to provide relevant data they have obtained to support reports on applications, provide evidence at hearings, and to inform submissions to relevant policies, bylaws and legislative reviews.

Data collection

Councils:

- Records of inspections, monitoring and compliance checks
- Public complaints relating to noise, nuisance and vandalism
- Geographic Information Systems (GIS) information on location of licensed premises, location of sensitive sites (e.g. schools, churches) census data (age distribution, socioeconomic data by mesh block)

Police:

- Undertaking compliance checks
- Complaints and follow up of alcohol related offending

Public Health Service:

- Community health and deprivation data
- Regional data analysis including Alcohol related Emergency Department Admissions

Marlborough Alcohol Governance Group

A group of agencies whose purpose is "To improve wellbeing in Marlborough by preventing alcohol related harm". MAGG priority areas include; delaying drinking, Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD), Hazardous drinking, Kaupapa Maori projects, Recognised Seasonal Employer (RSE) workers, Marlborough drinking patterns data, Local Alcohol Policy (LAP) update, and regional engagement.

Alcohol Harm Prevention Partnership Nelson Tasman

A group of agencies whose purpose is 'To improve wellbeing in Nelson Tasman communities by preventing alcohol related harm' by way of identification of priorities for action, undertaking projects, and reviewing and evaluating change. A recent commissioned research report has provided current 'alcohol related harm' information for the Nelson Tasman region, and identified the following priority areas to guide project development; Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD), underage drinking, hazardous drinking, older adults. The current project being developed is how to 'connect' with mid-life adult contemplators², in order to motivate them to take action to moderate their drinking.

Resources

Resources have been developed to reduce alcohol related harm across the Nelson Marlborough district and include; '0 alcohol when pregnant', Mocktail recipes, 'Drink Less, Live More', 'The Plan – Delay Teen Drinking'.

History

As with many other communities and towns in New Zealand, Marlborough is working hard to reduce alcohol related harm and the wider issues associated with alcohol. Community responses include working with on and off licences, young people, parents and the wider community to try and raise awareness of alcohol related harm.

In early 2013, the Marlborough District Council in association with ACC and the *then* Marlborough Alcohol Advisory Committee agreed to undertake an investigation into alcohol related harm issues in Marlborough. The 'review (In Toto Report) identified that there was a significant amount of harm occurring in the Marlborough district and although several initiatives were already in place, stakeholders agreed that more could be done.

Recommendations:

- Identify through available evidence the extent and nature of alcohol related problems in the Marlborough district
- Inform the development of a Local alcohol Policy as set out in the Sale and Supply of alcohol Act 2012
- Identify the demographics of the people and circumstances associated with alcohol related issues
- Provide baseline data for future monitoring of alcohol related problems
- Provide information to enable a coordinated approach to reducing alcohol related harm in Marlborough

Background

Marlborough achieved International Safe Community accreditation in March 2014.

The Steering Group driving the 'Safe and Sound @ the Top' project (SAS@TT) is a collaborative group comprising government and non-government agencies involved in the improvement of community safety in the Marlborough region.

The formation of an Alcohol Governance Group was built on the outcome of the wider community consultation meetings with groups and organizations working in the areas of alcohol related harm. It has been formed to encourage better linkages with community groups and identify and support initiatives and services around alcohol related harm in Marlborough.

This group will not be responsible for the delivery of programmes or actions but would be responsible for identifying the needs and engaging community support for actions to address those needs.

Purpose

The purpose of the group is to support better coordination, collaboration, coverage, training and understanding of Alcohol Related Harm.

Underpinning Principles

The Marlborough Alcohol Governance Group (MAGG) will operate in congruence with and promote the principles of the 'Safe and Sound at the Top' (SAS@TT) overall vision and Strategic Plan 2017- 2020 to include:

SAS@TT Principles: (over- riding)

- Safety is a fundamental human right
- People are at the heart of making communities safer places in which to live, work, learn, travel and play
- Everybody has a responsibility to promote and maintain their safety and the safety of others.

Marlborough Alcohol Governance Group Principles: (specific)

- Improve partnerships and integrated service delivery with alcohol related harm providers, specialists, education, health and social services
- Work to ensure the needs of communities are met
- Collective action on reducing alcohol related harm

Membership


Membership is open to any provider and stakeholders of any aspect of alcohol related harm in the community

Meetings

Meetings will be held at the discretion of the Marlborough Alcohol Governance Group (MAGG) members.

Meeting Chair

The Chair will be nominated annually from within the group. Administrative support can either be rotated or designated as a specific role from within the group. This person will be responsible for setting the agenda and taking the minutes as required.



Structure

The proposed structure was developed in consultation with a wide variety of community organisations working in alcohol related environments

Action Groups

Action Groups will report against an agreed action plan and feedback at both MAGG meetings and to the SAS@TT steering group. The groups will seek to nominate a lead in each of the action plan areas.

The Marlborough Alcohol Governance Group

(MAGG) will take effect of their principles by supporting the following action groups:

Hospitality and Licencing (previously Marlborough Alcohol Accord)

- Work together toward developing alcohol related harm information collation and distribution a data loop: local information guiding local initiatives.
- Contribute to improving alcohol related harm evaluation and research in the local area especially around sale and supply of alcohol

Treatment and Health

- Be informed by local information and data especially around emergency response outcomes
- Identify areas of need and develop responsive services or proposals for change
- Improve access to early intervention and prevention services
- Encourage training opportunities between providers
- Contribution to formal clinical education opportunities e.g. study days, education evenings for professionals, wider workforce and other providers

Road Safety Group

- Improve networking, co-ordination, collaboration and information flow between road safety and alcohol related service providers
- Identify new opportunities as they arise with the aim of further enhancing alcohol related harm delivery and activities.

Community Campaigns

- Develop resources to improve information dissemination for providers and for whanau as appropriate
- Develop resources and training systems to get others better able to link community to alcohol related harm support and services
- Key Linkages with other relevant collaborative forums to facilitate cross-representation

Tools

The key tool for achieving aims will be regular meetings that provide an opportunity for information sharing via service updates, networking and progress on the four action areas.

The Marlborough Alcohol Governance Group (MAGG) will need to develop an Action Plan supported by a regular meeting structure.

Outcomes

- 1. Provide a stock take of activities/programmes/projects currently happening to guide the development of new programmes (Appendix 3)
- 2. Identify potential projects for discussion and implementation into the community.
- 3. Develop and report against an agreed Action Plan
- 4. Support the development of the Results Based Accountability (RBA) reporting system for feedback to the 'Safe and Sound at the Top' (SAS@TT) Steering Group, the Safe Communities Foundations New Zealand (SCFNZ) and to the wider community and organizations

MAGG Action Plan Overview

In July 2017, SAS@TT commissioned an independent report scoping alcohol related harm in the Marlborough District. This report was presented to MAGG early 2018 and provided an update on current issues compared to those identified four years earlier building on the information that was gathered at that time.

The report aimed to: Identify through available evidence the extent and nature of alcohol related issues in the Marlborough district – Provide baseline data for future monitoring of alcohol related problems Identify the demographics of the people and circumstance associated with alcohol related issues – Provide information to enable a coordinated approach to reducing alcohol related harm it Marlborough

The outcome of this review recognised several opportunities for MAGG to initiate:

- MAGG to champion the promotion of programs and campaigns using the calendar of events
- MAGG to link with local industry better
- There is a need for more profiling of what is being done locally
- Engage with sporting codes more
- Support ongoing campaigns and reminders about not drinking and driving
- Develop a strategy that enables networking and collaboration between parties
- Maintain collaboration between all service providers and agencies with a focus on alcohol harm reduction
- Strengthen opportunities for collaboration on education campaigns with a particular focus on youth and parents/ guardians
- Develop opportunities for the youth of Marlborough to become involved in that are, fun, social and meaningful without alcohol

It was decided that ongoing actions include:

- Focus on young people, and the whanau of young people.
- Campaigns and programs targeting senior people would be developed once we had the new ambulance data available to understand where/why/how the harm was happening.
- Agreed actions would include the development of campaigns to target Sale and Supply of alcohol to minors' and the damage alcohol can cause to the young developing brain.
- Continue to use the 'Know your limits Marlborough' branding and supported by 3 key messages focused on:
 - 1. Young people and health (developing brain, poisoning, abuse, violence, 'lose a day, sexual assaults) Young people & caregivers
 - 2. Safer Partying & social drinking (pre-loading, OK to say no, delayed drinking, drink limits, look after your mates, #on the waters, importance of eating, safe drinking) Young people
 - 3. Sale and supply to young people (the law and responsibility) Caregivers and over 18s
